

- The National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council, through the Office of Civil Defense, annually recognizes outstanding performance of government entries, non-government instrumentalities and individuals for their exemplary contribution in promoting and implementing significant and gender sensitive DRRM, Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) programs and innovations that build community resiliency in the long term.
- 2. Gawad KALASAG, which stands for Kalamidad at Sakuna, Labanan, Sariling Galing ang Kaligtasan, remains to be one of the country's fully institutionalized program that promotes the spirit of volunteerism among agencies and individuals; measuring the capacity and capability of various stakeholders in identifying risks and vulnerabilities in the community, as well as addressing challenges on human-induced and natural emergencies and disasters.
- 3. In this year's search, significant development and changes in the guidelines for the 21<sup>st</sup> Gawad KALASAG Search were made to standardize the implementation of procedures and processes for both the stakeholders and the implementers. The amendment to guidelines is provided in **TAB B**.

  - b) Style Guide and Format (See Annex B of TAB B)
  - c) Approved Memorandum of Agreement between Winners and OCD (TAB C)

#### I. Reference

Memorandum Circular No. 03 s. 2018 dated 03 April 2018 on the Revised Guidelines on the Gawad KALASAG: Search for Excellence in Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) and Humanitarian Assistance CY 2017

#### II. BRIEF BACKGROUND

The annual Gawad KALASAG Search aims to recognize outstanding performances of Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (LDRRMCs), Barangay Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Committees (BDRRMCs), Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), Volunteer Organizations (VOs), People's Organizations (POs), schools such as Early Learning Centers (ELCs), Elementary, High School, and Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), Government Emergency Management or GEM, Hospitals, Private (Business/ Corporate) Organizations, and individuals who have shown acts of heroism before, during or after disasters and emergencies, and other major stakeholders that continue to render exemplary contribution in promoting and implementing significant and gender sensitive DRRM, Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) programs and innovations that build community resiliency in the long term.

One of the usual application process for the annual Gawad KALASAG is the submission of entries wherein nominees at the Regional and National level will undergo thorough desk evaluation and field validation. The Regional Selection Committee (RSC) shall submit at the National level, only relevant evidential documents in accordance with the standard Checklists. Only the top place winner per category will advance to the national level, and each must have garnered a

score of at least 80% and duly endorsed by the RSC to the NSC. The NSC shall determine the top three (3) nominees for each category thru desk evaluation, field validation and deliberation.

#### III. PURPOSE

This memorandum circular is issued to prescribe an amendment to the guidelines on the criteria (requirements/qualifications) and procedures (phases/steps) on the implementation of Gawad KALASAG Search for Excellence in DRRM and Humanitarian Assistance.

Specifically, this aims to provide the:

- enhancement of the criteria on stakeholders who may participate in the Search, i.e. government agencies and institutions; local government units; civil society organizations; private sectors, and individuals who have engaged in the promotion of inclusive DRR-CCA;
- standardization of the implementation of procedures and processes for both the stakeholders and the implementers, i.e. NDRRMC-OCD and its partners.

#### IV. AMMENDMENT

NDRRMC Memorandum Circular No. 03 s. 2018, particularly (1) Section III: Evaluation Process, (2) Section IV: Selection Committee, and (3) Section V: Recognition and Incentives, is hereby amended as follows:

#### A. EVALUATION PROCESS

#### STYLE GUIDE/TEMPLATE

The Style Guide/Template was formulated to standardize the format of all entries from various categories of the Gawad KALASAG. It was the result of the common agreement of the National Validators to develop a uniformed format for all entries to ensure equal opportunity for all the applicants and avoid the submission of unecessary voluminous documents for more expedient and accurate validation process.

In case the aforesaid agencies/organizations are not present and unavailable at the regional level, the Regional Selection Committee may opt to change or reorganize the composition of the validating teams.

For Heroic Act and Special Recognition categories, evaluation shall be done during the plenary session of the NSC.

#### 2. Roles and Functions

- a) Coordinate activities for the implementation of the national assessment;
- b) Set and update selection guidelines/criteria and guidance notes for the Search:
- c) Evaluate entries at the National level;
- d) Recommend the national winners of each category to the NDRRMC Chairperson;
- e) Prepare field validation reports of nominees and citations of all Gawad KALASAG national winners.

#### C. RECOGNITION AND INCENTIVES

#### 1. CATEGORIES

National and Regional winners for all categories shall receive plaques of recognition. Cash awards shall be given to the winners of selected categories at the National level.

For the Heroic Act Categories, a maximum of three (3) awardees shall likewise receive cash awards for each category. However, should there be more than one (1) awardee each for the individual and group categories; the maximum amount allowable for the said category shall be divided equally among the awardees.

# **ANNEX A**

#### Gawad KALASAG Style Guide

- All entries must contain an accurate and comprehensive table of contents; all pages must also contain a page number. Each criterion shall have a corresponding tabbing.
- 2. Attachment of pictures: All pictures must be in colored format; At least two (2) photo attachments are required for each page when supplemented with text description or a maximum of three (3) photos provided with text description. HD photos are required in order not to comprise its quality when expanded or otherwise.
- Scanned documents as attachment: Unless of utmost importance or relevance, such documents shall not be allowed to occupy the entire page. It is recommended that there are at least two (2) scanned copy of documents per page.
- 4. All of the entries shall be compiled or presented in one single document (or book).
- 5. Introduction shall be limited to the following:
  - -Brief description or profile of the category (city, school etc)
  - -Brief message and acknowledgements
  - -Executive Summary
- 6. Use of standardized font, font size, paper size, paper orientation, line spacing, indents, and number of pages for all entries.
  - Font type: Times New Roman/Arial
  - Font size for the context: 12
  - Paper orientation: Portrait
  - Paper size: A4
  - Line spacing: Single spacing
  - Indents provided for in the style guide sample format
  - Maximum pages: <u>300</u> including annexes and attachments (not back-to-back)
- The entry shall be hardbound (solid/laminated format), unless there is a proof of unavailability of hard binding in the area or place (e.g remote Barangays).
- 8. There shall be a color coding of entries' cover page per category.

-L/B DRRMC: Red -CSO: Yellow -PO: Orange -VO: Violet

-Schools: Green -Hospitals: Blue

-Special Recognition: White

9. The presentation of compliance in different categories shall be clear, concise and straight to the point; it is highly encouraged to avoid unnecessary inclusions in the presentation.

Annexes shall be limited to the following:

- Means of verification
- Relevant photos
- Clearances/ Titles
- Minutes of the meeting
- MOA/U
- Any relevant/primary documents that will prove a certain claim.
- 10. Maximum number of pages: Standard in all categories, the maximum number of page per entries shall be 300, including the introduction and annexes. Deliberate non-compliance shall constitute disqualification from the Search.

#### ١. INTRODUCTION TO THE AGENCY

#### **Background**


The National Civil Defense Administration (NCDA) was established in 1954 by virtue of Republic Act No. 1190, otherwise known as Civil Defense Act of 1954. Organized under the Office of the President, the NCDA was mandated to "establish and administer a comprehensive national civil defense program; formulate and prepare at all times plans and policies for the protection and welfare of the civilian population in time of war directly involving the Philippines or other national emergency of equally grave character..." In 1970, the administration of then president Ferdinand E. Marcos saw the need to establish a Disaster and Calamities Plan by an Inter-Departmental Planning Group on Disasters and Calamities. Two years later, the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) was established by virtue of Letter of Instruction (LOI) No. 19 effectively replacing the NCDA. Under its new charter, the OCD was tasked to "coordinate national level activities and functions of the national government, private institutions and civic organizations" Finally in 1978, through Presidential Decree (PD) 1566, the National Diffrater Coordinating Council (NDCC) was established as the highest policy-making body and the focal organization for disaster management in the country<sup>2</sup>.
